# Welcome to The Ginger Café

The Kona Community Hospital has been undergoing change over that past several months. A cafeteria development project team, consisting of employees from the dietary, contracts, marketing and revenue cycle departments has been hard at work to identify process and revenue improvement opportunities. The goal is to create a more café-like environment.

In October, the cafeteria implemented an upgraded cash register system. This system eliminated the meal ticket process and allows patrons to purchase food items with cash or credit card. This process is more convenient for staff and visitors. It also allows Dietary staff to manage food items and inventory appropriately. Additionally, cafeteria prices were adjusted to fair market prices. The adjustments were necessary in order to maintain the high quality of products offered.

The cafeteria has been in need of attention such as the recent ceiling upgrade. Soon, the cafeteria will undergo renovations which will improve the café's ergonomics and flow through the tray line. KCH received Capital Improvement Project (CIP) funds from the State designated for this upgrade. CIP funds are restricted to maintenance and facility improvement projects, and cannot be used for day to day hospital operations.

The cafeteria provides a meeting place for employees and visitors to have lunch, a snack or just enjoy a cup of coffee. Because it is an essential location at our facility, the project team decided it is time for our cafeteria to have a name. After careful deliberation, the team selected "The Ginger Café" as the name. The team felt that this new moniker is a perfect fit because it reflects the values wrapped into the KCH *Island Floral Logo* theme.

# **Pharmacy Techs Earn Certifications**

Technicians who pass the (ExCPT) Pharmacy Exam are granted the title of Certified Pharmacy Technician (CPhT). Employees with Pharmacy Technician Certifications will typically perform work delegated by a licensed pharmacist in accordance with state rules.

The newly certified techs, or CPhT's, have been testing for their national Pharmacy Technician Certifications for several months. In addition to self-quided study, KCH pharmacists tutored the techs to make their goal a reality.

As CPhT's, the pharmacy techs will soon begin training to take patient medical histories in the Emergency Department.

# **Used Clothing & Slippahs Being Accepted**

It is not uncommon for patients to find themselves at KCH without clothing or shoes. Emergency department staff often must cut clothes off in order to treat a patient. Or, the clothes may be unsalvageable for other reasons. This creates a dilemma for the patient and staff at discharge.



Is it appropriate to discharge a patient wearing only a hospital gown? This is a question that has troubled Behavioral Health manager, Steven Payne for some time.

"A lot of our patients are very poor, or they may not have anyone to bring them clothing from outside the hospital," says Payne. "Regardless of a patient's situation, we should be able to offer a discharge with dignity."

For the past decade, the Behavioral Health Unit has been collecting and distributing clothing and slippers to be distributed as needed to emergency department, nursing units and Kalani Ola patients. Three years ago, Payne began visiting local area thrift stores to ask for donations of unwanted clothes and slippers. In March, the KCH Auxiliary donated several boxes of clothing items to Steven prior to opening their annual rummage sale.

"We really need comfortable shirts, shorts, pants and footwear for our patients," Steven says. "Clothes should be appropriate for all patients...sweatpants, athletic shorts and tshirts are great."
